Sahrmann Lectureship: Dr. Gwendolen Jull

Friday, Sept. 30

The Sahrmann Lectureship will be held on Friday, September 30 at 4:00-5:00 PM (Virtual). Dr. Gwendolen Jull, AO, MPhty, PhD, FACP will be the guest speaker presenting the lecture titled "Headache Related Neck Pain - Who should we treat?" Gwen Jull is an Emeritus Professor in Physiotherapy at The University of Queensland, Australia. She is a specialist musculoskeletal physiotherapist and Fellow of the Australian College of Physiotherapists. Her career has combined teaching, research and clinical practice. Her research has been concerned with the diagnosis and management of idiopathic neck pain, headache and whiplash associated disorders and quantifying the dysfunction in the cervical motor system. Her most recent research has investigated the relationship between headache associated neck pain and cervical musculoskeletal dysfunction. Gwen has taught nationally and internationally and has published over 300 articles, 40 book chapters as well as three textbooks, the most recent being the 2019 text Management of

neck pain disorders: A research informed approach Elsevier, UK.

Gwen is also the co-editor of the international journal, *Musculoskeletal Science and Practice*. **Register here**.

Methods in Education Scholarship Course



The Academy of Educators in collaboration with the MERU is offering, "Methods in Education Scholarship," for the second time this fall. The course will run from Oct. 24 to Dec. 21 on Zoom. This is a certificate program for educators who would like to develop their skills for education research and scholarship. The program will equip educators to plan an education research/scholarship project and write a full proposal that can be used to implement the project, apply to the IRB for approval to do research with human participants, and/or apply for an education grant. 
