Like many of you, I spent a fair amount of May on clinical service. For those of you that do not know, I am a general internist and currently, I only see patients in the hospital. I worked with amazing residents and students and together we delivered some excellent care, but the burden of disease and social determinants of health felt heavier than I can ever recall. Is this the sequelae of COVID? A temporary but painful blip after a period where many did not seek care and the economy was destabilized, especially for our most vulnerable? Or will this be a lasting change? I believe that it is likely a mix of both.

2023-2025 Loeb Fellows Announced

Congratulations to Lindsay Clukies, MD and Mariam Malik, MD for being selected as the Loeb Teaching Fellows for the term of July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2025.

Dr. Lindsay Clukies: Safe Storage Project Curriculum

This project will develop a curriculum to meet national and local gaps in baseline knowledge of the impact of preventable gun-related injuries and death. The focus will be on firearms as a public health epidemic followed by evidence-based strategies for patient and family counseling and concluding with safe storage recommendations and techniques. The goal is to distribute this curriculum for national implementation by other programs and dramatically reduce firearm injuries.



Dr. Mariam Malik: Interactive, Integrated Curriculum for Radiology-Anatomy Correlation

This project will engage students to compound their anatomy knowledge through interactive radiologic clinical application exercises and interpretive imaging skills. The goals are to improve student performance on applied anatomy assessment questions in the Gateway curriculum and enhance anatomical understanding/application in clinical care.
