SAFE Flowcharts Illustrate the Reporting Process



We all play a role in building a safe, inclusive environment at WashU Medicine, and part of that responsibility is to understand how to report unprofessional or inappropriate behaviors. Earlier this year, the Climate & Culture Implementation Task Force provided information about our single "front door" for reporting unprofessional or inappropriate behaviors through the <u>Supporting a Fair Environment (SAFE) program's online portal</u>.
