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

Call for Loeb Teaching Fellows Applications Due October 13th

On behalf of Loeb Selection Committee co-chairs, Dr. Eva Aagaard and Dr. Abby Spencer, we are pleased to announce the call for applications for Loeb Teaching Fellows. Applications will be accepted beginning August 30th and are due by Friday, October 13, 2023 at 5:00pm.

The Loeb Teaching Fellows program was established in 2004 by a generous gift from Mr. and Mrs. Loeb to support faculty who are committed to excellence and innovation in teaching and education. The program provides fellows with the time and opportunity to develop and implement innovative ideas that augment the education of medical students, residents and fellows. All Washington University School of Medicine faculty (including volunteer faculty) at any level are eligible to apply. These prestigious fellowships are the cornerstone of our innovation in education efforts and are critical to helping WUSM grow as a world-class center for educational excellence.



There will be two (2) Loeb Teaching Fellowships available this term, supported jointly by the BJH Foundation and WUSM; the Fellowship term will run two years, beginning July 1, 2024 and ending June 30, 2026. A mid-term review and renewal is required in 2025. Loeb Teaching Fellows will receive \$50,000 per year for two years for salary compensation only to enable dedicating a significant portion of his/her time to development and implementation of their project and direct teaching of medical students and/or residents.

Call for Small Grants Applications




The Academy of Educators in collaboration with the Medical Education Research Unit (MERU) of the Washington University School of Medicine are pleased to announce the call for proposals for grant funding for education research and scholarship projects. Projects must be focused on the scholarship of teaching and learning, rather than biomedical discovery or application. Proposals may originate from any unit within the School of Medicine. The principal investigator must be a WUSM faculty member. Grants of up to \$5000 will be awarded based on a competitive review process. Call for Foundations in Teaching Skills Applications



The Foundations in Teaching Skills (FITS) application is open. This certificate program targets junior educators (approximately 1-5 years out of training) as well as faculty who are newly incorporating teaching excellence into their careers. This certificate program runs from October to June each academic year. The FITS program focuses on foundational teaching skills, establishing a community of educators with each program cohort, and beginning the process of producing one's educator portfolio. Over the course of the academic year, participants will receive mentorship as well as feedback on their teaching skills through direct observations. 

Snowden Supports CareSTL Health Project O Run/Walk



Third-year medical student Adam Snowden volunteered for CareSTL Health's Project O: Opioid Run/Walk to help raise awareness of the opioid crisis. "For the past 2 years, I've been president of the Health Professional Student Leadership Committee (HPSLC), WUSM's interprofessional student organization that aims to promote interprofessional relationships through service, social events, and professional development. The pillar of service has resonated most with me; HPSLC has aimed to organize and promote volunteer opportunities for addressing issues that are pervasive among all professions, including homelessness, food security, and mental health first aid," said Snowden.

One of these issues is opioid addiction and its vast detrimental effects on one's health and well-being. Through his work with HPSLC, Snowden was connected with CareSTL and asked to recruit health students to help with the event. Snowden was able to secure 10-15 students who fulfilled the requested role of medical volunteers, as well as general volunteers who assisted with setup/takedown.

"Whether it's 5 or 50 volunteers, by helping with events such as these throughout the year, we hope to give back to our St. Louis community and kickstart a pattern of interprofessional service throughout our various careers," said Snowden.
